

FEES AND FINANCIAL AID

Fees

Comprehensive tuition, room, board and general fees total \$26,500.00 for the year 2007-2008. These yearly amounts are based upon two semesters in residence on campus. See additional information below concerning tuition.

The total cost of educating a student at Alderson-Broaddus College for one year is significantly more than the amount paid by the student. Gifts to Alderson-Broaddus from churches, trustees, alumni, and other friends, along with endowment income and certain efficiency factors, provide the difference. The College strives to keep the cost to parents and students as reasonable as possible, consistent with the development and maintenance of an instructional staff and campus facilities, which assure high-quality education. The College reserves the right to adjust charges from year to year in accordance with operating costs and inflationary trends.

Tuition

Tuition charges are based on the number of college-sponsored semester hours attempted, whether on or off campus. These rates apply to full-time and part-time students. The charge for 2007-2008 is \$660 per semester hour.

Students are charged tuition based on a per-credits hour basis up through 11 semester hours, at \$660 per credit hour. For a credit hour load of 12-20 hours, students are charged a flat fee of \$9,915 per semester. Semester hours taken beyond 20 hours are charged on a per-credit hour basis.

For the medical/radiological technology and physician assistant programs, tuition variances do occur, as the result of the required clinical experience needed for these programs. These charges are specified on page 27.

General Fee (2007-2008)

The general fee of \$100 per semester is assessed for students who register for 12 or more semester hours, and \$50.00 per semester for students who register for 7-11 semester hours. This required fee includes charges for student activities, student center, student publications, and special events, and is administered by the Student Government Association (SGA).

Special Fees

Special fees will be assessed on a nonrecurring basis to students requesting special academic services.

Room and Board

As long as college facilities are available, all un-married students are required to live in college residence halls except as noted on page 26 under "Residence Hall Living." The College will determine the number of occupants in each room. College residence hall rooms are rented for \$1,575 per student, double occupancy, per semester in 2007-2008. When double rooms are permitted to be used as single rooms, a 50 percent increase in rent is charged.

Opening and closing dates for residence halls are stipulated in the academic calendars on pages vi and vii. Any students needing to arrive earlier must secure permission from the vice president for student services and pay for the extra room and board. Residence halls will be closed when the College is not in regular session, except for those students whose course of study or campus work requires them to remain at the College. Such students must obtain permission from the director of residence life to remain on campus, must observe all college regulations, will be charged full room and board rates for all such days on campus, and may be required to live in rooms other than the ones they occupy during the regular session.

The College reserves the right to use residence hall rooms for the housing of visitors during prolonged vacation periods. Students are notified of such use in advance of the vacation period when this is contemplated.

The College has contracted with a professional food service management company for its food services and attempts to maintain high quality facilities and service. Board costs are \$1,660 per semester in 2007-2008. All resident students are charged for full board in the College dining hall. No refunds are granted for meals missed.

Refunds

Course Withdrawals

If a student drops a course up through the regular registration period, the student is not charged for that course. However, if a student withdraws from a course following the regular registration period, he/she will be charged for the tuition.

Withdrawal from the College

For students who withdraw from the College during the fall or spring semester, pro-rata refunds of tuition, room and board will be given through the ninth week of the semester. All financial aid awarded for the semester will be pro-rated as well. No refunds will be given to students who withdraw after the ninth week, or to students who are dismissed or suspended from the College.

The pro-rating will be based on:

1. A 15-week semester
2. Rounding of the refund down to the nearest 10% of the time period after:

- a. Deducting any unpaid charges owed by the student, which the student has been charged.
- b. Adding an administrative fee of 5% of the charges assessed or \$100, whichever is less.

Summer Semester

Summer semester students will be granted pro-rata refunds up to a maximum of 60 percent of a five (5) week term, subject to the additional conditions of number two (2) above. No refunds will be given to students who withdraw after the third week, or to students who are dismissed or suspended from the College.

Music Fees

During the first month of classes, the applied music fee will be refunded in full minus 1/14 of the fee for each lesson taken, including unexcused absences. After one month from the first day of classes no refunds will be granted.

Financial Aid

The primary responsibility for the cost of a student's education must rest with the student and their parents. However, Alderson-Broaddus College gives limited financial assistance to promising and deserving students who present evidence of special need. Also, certain grants are available that are based on academic record or special skills. A program of aid includes scholarships, grants, loans and work. Because the demand is always greater than the resources available, the amount granted to any individual student must be limited. In most cases, however, students will receive a combination of scholarship, loan and work which, added to their own resources, will enable them to meet college expenses. The student must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid in order to be considered for any Institutional, State or Federal assistance (See also page 23). The College's priority deadline is March 1.

Charges Payable

All accounts with the college must be paid in full before a student is permitted to register for another semester. Transcripts and diplomas will be withheld until the student's financial obligations to the College have been met.

All term or semester charges are due and payable on or before registration day. If the balance is not paid, interest will be charged on the amount still due at the end of each month, excluding August and January. The interest rate is 6% over twelve months (ex. \$100 x 6% divided by 12 = \$0.50)

Financial Aid Categories

Financial aid falls into specific categories and is administered by carefully planned policies. The categories include scholarships, grants, loans and work opportunities.

Endowed and Annual Scholarships

Internal Scholarship and Grants

Alderson-Broaddus College provides a number of scholarships and grants through the College budget. The Financial Aid Office of the College awards these funds. These awards are renewable if the student maintains minimum requirements established by the College.

Music Scholarships are awarded annually by audition to students who major in music education, music performance (applied music), or musical arts. Awards are recommended by the music faculty and are based on performance ability, academic record, and ability to contribute to Music Department ensembles and functions.

Music Participation Scholarships are awarded to non-music majors who qualify by participating in selected Music Department musical ensembles and who are nominated by the director(s) of the ensemble(s) and approved by the music faculty.

“The West Virginians” Scholarships, based on vocal talent, are awarded to students selected by the director. Annual auditions are required for renewal.

Humanities Performance Scholarships are awarded to students majoring or working in art, broadcasting, speech/debate, theatre and writing. Significant performance obligations are required of students receiving these scholarships. The Humanities Division makes recommendations for this scholarship.

Athletic Grants-in-Aid are awarded to student athletes. These awards are recommended by the respective coaches under the leadership of the director of athletics.

Presidential Scholarships, Academic Excellence Scholarships, and Blue & Gold Scholarships are awarded to first-time students based upon grade point average and/or ACT/SAT scores.

Academic Excellence Scholarships are awarded to transfer students based upon grade point average and/or ACT/SAT scores.

State Assistance

West Virginia Higher Education Grant Program awards, based on need and academic record, are available to students attending Alderson-Broaddus College. To receive a West Virginia State Grant, a student must be a resident of West Virginia and must file his/her FAFSA and common application before March 1. Pennsylvania, and Rhode Island also award their state grants to students attending Alderson-Broaddus College. Inquiries should be made through high school counselors or the College Financial Aid Office. For 2007-2008, West Virginia Higher Education Grant Program award recipients at A-B are awarded \$3,074. Students must meet certain academic and financial need criteria for renewal and complete the FAFSA before March 1.

West Virginia PROMISE (Providing Real Opportunities for Maximizing In-state Student Excellence) **Scholarship Program**, offers each West Virginia high school graduate who meets all the criteria established by the state a scholarship. For 2007-2008, Promise recipients at A-B are awarded \$4,098. For renewal all students must complete 30 credit hours in a 12 month period, and earn a

cumulative grade point average of at least 3.0 on a 4.0 scale; provided, however, that for the first year a Promise award is received, the applicant may be eligible for renewal if he or she earned at least a 2.75 GPA.

Higher Education Adult Part-Time Student Grant (HEAPS) - The purpose of the HEAPS Grant Program is to encourage and enable needy West Virginia students, who desire to continue their education on a part-time basis at the post-secondary level. Recipients will be selected each year by the college based on the applicant's eligibility and the availability of funds. Applicants must submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

Federal Assistance

The following grants are awarded to students attending Alderson-Broaddus College:

Federal **Pell Grants** are awarded on the basis of the Expected Family Contribution and the Pell Grant Payment Schedule published by the United States Department of Education. The U.S. Department of Education uses a standard formula to evaluate the information on the application. The formula produces an Expected Family Contribution (EFC) number. Assuming the student has met all other eligibility requirements and the EFC is 4,110 (for 2007-2008) or less, the student may receive a Federal Pell Grant. Pell grants can range from \$400-\$4,310 (for 2007-2008).

To be considered for a Pell Grant, a FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) must be filed and any request for documentation must be submitted to the Financial Aid Office. FAFSA's are available at high school counseling offices and the College Financial Aid Office, and online at www.fafsa.ed.gov.

Academic Competitiveness Grant. An Academic Competitiveness Grant will provide up to \$750 for the first year of undergraduate study and up to \$1,300 for the second year of undergraduate study to full-time students who are eligible for a Federal Pell Grant and who had successfully completed a rigorous high school program, as determined by the state or local education agency and recognized by the Secretary of Education. Second year students must also have maintained a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of at least 3.0. The program will be available for the first time for the 2006-07 school year for first year students who graduated from high school after January 1, 2005. The Academic Competitiveness Grant Award is in addition to the student's Pell Grant Award.

National Science and Mathematics Access to Retain Talent Grant or National Smart Grant. A National SMART Grant will provide up to \$4,000 for each of the third and fourth years of undergraduate study to full-time students who are eligible for a Federal Pell Grant and who are majoring in physical, life, or computer sciences, mathematics, technology, or engineering or in a foreign language determined critical to national security. The student must also have maintained a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of at least 3.0 in coursework required for the major. The National SMART Grant Award is in addition to the student's Pell Grant Award.

Federal **Supplemental Education Opportunity Grants** are awarded to

students who demonstrate exceptional financial need; priority is given to Pell Grant recipients. Renewal of these awards is based upon continued need and satisfactory academic progress at Alderson-Broaddus College. Students must apply early to be eligible to receive this grant.

Loans

The following loans are available to students who attend Alderson-Broaddus College:

Federal Perkins Loans are awarded to students who demonstrate financial need. These loans range from \$500 to \$4,000 per year. The total amount a student can borrow, as an undergraduate is \$20,000. The total amount of these loans available to students in a given year is limited by the amount allocated by the federal government to the College. Based upon annual congressional action, these loans are at an interest rate of 5%. Cancellation provisions are also available. Check with the Financial Aid Office for additional information.

Federal Stafford Loans – also called Subsidized Loans – are loans on which the federal government pays the interest while the student is in school and during the specified deferment periods. The student will apply for and receive the loan through the College by completing and submitting the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The maximum loan is \$3,500 for the first year, \$4,500 for the second year, \$5,500 for the third and fourth year and \$8,500 for graduate students. The maximum interest rate is fixed at 6.8% for any loans made after July 1, 2006.

Federal Unsubsidized Stafford Loans – also called Unsubsidized Stafford Loan. Students can get these loans regardless of need, but will have to pay all interest charges throughout the term of the loan. Independent students are eligible to apply for an additional amount of unsubsidized loan if needed in the amounts of \$4,000 for the first two years and \$5,000 for the third and fourth years. Graduate students are eligible for an additional \$12,000.

Federal PLUS Loans (for parents and graduates) – This program enables students and parents to receive funds through American Education Services (AES). There is a 3% origination fee. There are flexible repayment options for parents and graduate students. The interest rate is fixed for any loans made after July 1, 2006. See the Financial Aid Office for more information.

For the purposes of federal loan eligibility, students are classified as follows:

- 0-23 credit hours earned – Freshman
- 24-48 credit hours earned – Sophomore
- 49-72 credit hours earned – Junior
- 73+ credit hours earned – Senior

Students who meet these credit hour minimums may be classified at a lower grade level by the program in which they are enrolled.

Other Loans and Grants

Nursing Loans are awarded to upperclass nursing students who demonstrate financial need. These loans range from \$500 to \$4,000 per year. The total amount

a student can borrow, as an undergraduate is \$13,000. The total amount of these loans available to students in a given year is limited by the amount allocated. These loans are at an interest rate of 5%. Check with the Financial Aid Office for more information.

American Baptist Scholarships – certain criteria apply to all recipients of American Baptist Financial Aid. Applicant must be a member of an American Baptist Church for at least one year before applying for aid. Applicant must be a U.S. citizen. See the Financial Aid office for more information.

The **West Virginia Baptist Education Society** provides annually a number of non-interest scholarship loans directed to “improve the education levels of the Baptist ministry in West Virginia.” One year of the loan is canceled for each year served in ministry within the state. It is possible to cancel the entire loan. Information may be secured through the Society, in care of the West Virginia Baptist Convention, 1019 Juliana Street, Parkersburg, WV 26101.

The **American Baptist Women of West Virginia** have a limited number of scholarships available for Baptist women who are residents of West Virginia and are active members of an American Baptist Church. Information may be obtained through the state chairman of scholarships for the American Baptist Women or through the West Virginia Baptist Convention, 1019 Juliana Street, Parkersburg, WV 26101.

Other scholarships and grants are available through businesses, unions, clubs, churches and other organizations. Check with local chapters of organizations, high school counselors, and the Financial Aid Office.

Work Program

Opportunities for student employment are available on campus with assignments in the dining hall, campus store, library, residence halls, offices, and maintenance department, and in other academic and administrative departments.

Satisfactory Academic Progress for Financial Aid – In order to be eligible to receive federal, and/or, state or institutional financial aid, federal regulations require that a student be making satisfactory progress toward the completion of his/her degree or program. These standards apply to each potential financial aid recipient, whether a previous aid recipient or not. In addition, Alderson-Broaddus College has established academic standards for the renewal of internally funded grants and scholarships, and various donors have established criteria for the renewal of their endowed scholarships and grants. Copies of policies regarding Satisfactory Academic Progress and renewal of internally funded and endowed scholarships and grants are available at www.ab.edu or upon request in the Financial Aid Office.

Financial Aid – International Students

International students receiving financial assistance from the College are required to secure a United States Social Security Number (SSN) or have an Alien Registration Number. The College is required to report all college-administered financial aid to the Internal Revenue Service. Financial aid in excess of tuition and fees becomes taxable to the student. State and federal taxes, if any, will be charged to the student. International students must complete an institutional application for financial aid.
